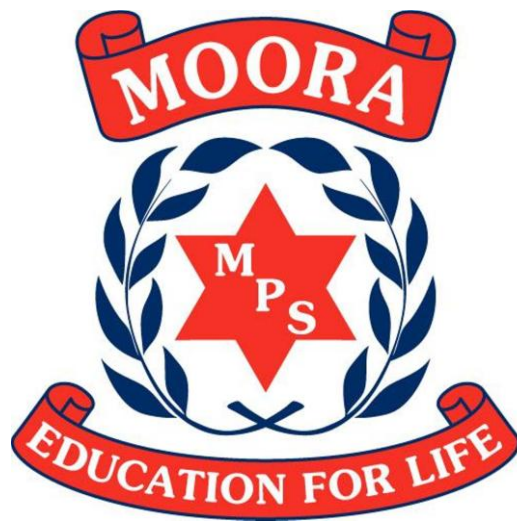

4 YEAR OLD KINDERGARTEN PROGRAM

We endeavour to provide children with a fun and engaging experience for their first year of schooling and build on existing knowledge, skills and interests to facilitate development of the whole child. Our program supports and challenges each child and is based around a balance of;

- Child-directed play – where the child chooses how, when, with what and with whom to engage
- Teacher-guided play – where the teacher manages the play environment to achieve specific outcomes
- Intentional teaching – where the teacher plans and delivers explicit instruction to achieve specific outcomes.

Planned and incidental learning occurs throughout the day as a whole class, in small groups and individually. The Early Years Framework and The Kindergarten Curriculum Guidelines underpin the Kindergarten program at Moora Primary School.

The Early Years Framework

The first four years in a child's life are vitally important in terms of education as they are the years when a child is laying down foundations for all future learning and participation in society. This document describes five broad outcomes which underpin our teaching programs;

1. Children have a strong sense of identity
2. Children are connected to and contribute to their world
3. Children have a strong sense of well-being
4. Children are confident and involved learners
5. Children are effective communicators



The Kindergarten Curriculum Guidelines

The School Curriculum and Standards Authority is responsible for curriculum guidelines for all Western Australia Schools K-12. The Kindergarten Curriculum Guidelines focus on children's learning and development consistent with the Early Years Framework.

In Kindergarten, we focus on personal and social competence and pre-literacy and pre-numeracy skills. Every student is an individual and we strive to plan and support each student to their own developmental level, addressing students' academic, social, behavioural, emotional, psychological and physical needs.

Essential pre-literacy skills will be explicitly taught in whole group and small group sessions using the Promoting Literacy Development program developed by Diana Rigg.

Children will also take part in many hands-on activities, exploration and play opportunities to support these sessions and further develop these skills. Movement and Motor Skills will be taught throughout the Kindergarten Program, as well as the Physical Education Program with our specialist teacher.

ARRIVAL AND MORNING ROUTINE

Arrival

In the interest of safety, all children must be dropped off and picked up from the Kindy classroom by a parent or a nominated adult. Please notify the teacher via your child's communication book if there are any changes to this routine. Please also let us know if your child will be travelling to and/or from school via the bus.

Students are able to enter the classroom when the door opens from 8:30am onwards. Due to safety reasons, please keep your child off the outside play equipment before and after school. Your assistance in this regard is most appreciated.

Morning Routine and Separating from Your Child

On arrival, students are to place their bags on the hooks outside the room and bring their piece of fruit, lunchbox, water bottle and communication book inside. It is very important that you help your child to become responsible for their own belongings. At the beginning of the year you may need to lead the unpacking of the bag but as the year progresses your child should be capable of unpacking it on their own, with you available to assist if they have a lot to carry inside.

Parents are welcome to stay at this time to have a look at displayed work, do puzzles or read a book to their child. When the classroom bell is rung (at approximately 9.00am), we ask that parents take this opportunity to say goodbye to their child and leave.

If your child cries, leave them with the Teacher or Education Assistant. Please leave quickly because for some children the initial separation is hard and staying with your child will only prolong this. Usually when they see their parents are gone, they happily settle down to enjoy themselves. Please be assured that we will contact you by phone if there are any problems.

Parents can make the parting more difficult by being over concerned and by lingering too long and please do not disappear without saying goodbye as this is upsetting to children. Talk to your child about what to expect at school; bells ringing, taking turns, putting your hand up to speak, playing inside/outside, fruit time, story time, staying seated at mat time, singing songs, visiting the library - these will all be new to your child.

For more information about preparing your child for starting Kindy and settling them in during the first few weeks, see the end of this booklet.

WHAT TO BRING

Each day your child will need;

- School bag (with a change of clothes in a plastic bag)
- A piece of fruit / vegetable for Crunch & Sip
- A lunch box with a healthy lunch
- A water bottle (water only)
- Their communication book
- Library bag on Library day



Children are asked to only bring toys or personal items on their News Day. More information regarding this will be given out at the beginning of the term.

Uniform and Shoes

PLEASE NAME ALL ITEMS OF CLOTHING

Kindergarten students are required to wear the Moora Primary School shirt which can be purchased from Topp Dogg or Concept Signs and navy blue shorts or skort. All students MUST wear a MPS hat which can also be purchased from Top Dogg or Concept Signs. Students are not permitted to wear caps.

Sturdy footwear is essential in Kindergarten – Velcro sandals or shoes are ideal as they also teach the children independence. Thongs are NOT allowed.

If you have any questions regarding the uniform requirements, please see the school office.

Although children do wear aprons for messy activities, it is impossible to keep them completely clean and we apologise in advance! Most of the paint should come out with a cold water wash.

Stationery List

In Kindergarten, equipment and stationery materials are shared. It would be appreciated if ALL of these items could be supplied within the first week of school starting. If you need another copy of the stationery list, please see the school office.

FAMILY INVOLVEMENT / COMMUNICATION

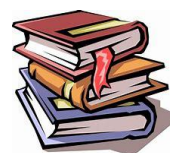
Parent / Caregiver Help

Parents and caregivers are encouraged to participate in the Kindergarten program, in whatever capacity they are able, as this will assist in building a positive relationship between home and school. A voluntary roster for help will be sent out by the teacher at various points throughout the year and you are encouraged to write your name against a time that suits. We would prefer that younger siblings do not attend so that you can enjoy some quality time with your child and the other students.

Communication

We value open communication between families and staff and regularly communicate with families in a number of ways including;

- Whole School Newsletter – 3 times a term (please provide the office with your email address)
- Noticeboard outside the classroom
- Individual emails or phone calls
- Facebook Page
- Seesaw App
- Possible communication book between home and school



The more we understand your child, the more we can help them to learn, socialise and interact with their peers. Please tell us about anything that may affect learning or behaviour at school, as well as any changes to normal routines. You are encouraged to write/place any notes for the teacher inside your child's communication book. This will be checked each morning. Likewise, any notes from the teacher will be placed inside the book for you to find at home. Please make sure you check the book each afternoon. Alternatively, please email the classroom teacher or phone the school.

If you would like to meet with the Kindergarten teacher, please make an appointment as there is often too much going on at the beginning and end of the school day. This will allow for privacy and uninterrupted attention to issues relating to your child.

Any specific legal requirements involving your child MUST be communicated to the school office with relevant documentation.

ATTENDANCE

If your child is absent for any reason, we ask that you notify the teacher. Although Kindergarten is not compulsory to enrol in, once you have enrolled your child it is expected that they attend. Therefore, any absences must be explained. This can be through a phone call to the office in the morning, a note in the communication book, an email to the teacher or the school office, or a note when your child returns to school. If you know your child will be away in advance, please feel free to let us know before the date.

It is important to be punctual. Students who arrive late miss out on important routines and interactions. If your child is late, please sign them in via the school office and collect a late slip to give to the teacher. If you need to take your child during the school day, please fill out the book in the front office prior to collecting your child from the Kindy. Please phone the school office if you are going to be unavoidable delayed at the end of the school day.

MEDICAL INFORMATION

Be Allergy Aware

Moora PS is allergy aware due to the risk of anaphylaxis reactions in some people. Anaphylaxis is a severe, rapidly progressive allergic reaction that is potentially life threatening. Some of the most common allergens in school aged children are peanuts, eggs, nuts, shellfish, wheat, soy and certain insect venom.

Medical Conditions

If your child has any medical conditions, please provide the school office and the teacher with detailed information. We are unable to provide suitable care for your child if we are unaware of a condition. A necessary 'Action Plan' will be formulated so that if an emergency arises, a step by step process can be implemented quickly and calmly.

If a child is taking medication, and you wish for staff to administer it, please note;

- Only medications prescribed by a doctor will be considered
- All instructions for times and dosages MUST be in writing
- Medicines must be correctly labelled and handed to staff, not left in the child's bag
- A medication record will be kept for children on regular, long-term medication

We very much appreciate when parents are able to come to the school and administer antibiotics and other medication to their child.

Illnesses and Accidents

The children love coming to Kindergarten and often want to attend even when they are sick. To help curb the spread of infection to other children and staff, please keep your child at home if he/she is unwell. Information about communicable diseases and when to keep children home from school, is available on the WA Department of Health's website and you can also find some of the more common ones in the MPS Whole School Information Book.

Accidents do occur in schools from time to time so it essential that home phone and emergency contact numbers are up to date at all times.

Toileting

Unless there is a previous known condition, children should be able to go to the toilet independently and wash their hands afterwards. You may like to talk to your child about going to the toilet and assure them that they can go at any time without being afraid. Your child may need some practice learning how to wipe their bottom independently over summer as they prepare to begin Kindergarten.

Please provide a spare change of clothes in a plastic bag inside your child's school bag to use in case of accidents. Coming to Kindy is an exciting time and with so many fun activities to do and friends to play with it is quite normal for a couple of accidents to occur at the beginning of the year due to the child being so involved they simply forget to go.

BEHAVIOUR MANAGEMENT

The students, staff, parents and caregivers and wider community at Moora consider it a joint responsibility to work together to provide a safe, supportive and consistent environment in which all our students learn and develop academic, physical, artistic and social skills.

Classroom management at Moora Primary School centres on the following focus areas: Developing Positive Relationships, Encouraging Desirable Behaviour, Teaching New Skills and Managing Misbehaviour.

Knowing the rules and routines at school helps young children feel more relaxed and in control. Rules will be developed in regards to appropriate behaviour, safety and use of particular equipment. We will work to ensure that all students understand why those rules are in place.

REPORTING

Your child will receive a formal report in term two and term four. As well as these reports, you will be encouraged to participate in parent/teacher meetings and other events such as a Learning Journey where your child can share their learning with you.

LIBRARY

We will be starting to visit the library in Term 1 to learn about books and how to use the library. Your child will be able to start borrowing a book to take home for the week.

Books can only be taken home in a library bag (which is requested on the Personal Items list). Book bags can come in on Day 1 if you have them ready and they will be stored safely until we begin to borrow books. We will inform you of the children's library day.

CRUNCH & SIP

Moora PS is a Crunch & Sip School. Each day, we have a set break to eat a piece of fresh fruit or vegetable and drink some water. This is an important part of our whole school Healthy Eating Policy. We encourage you to send some fresh fruit or vegetables either cut up or whole, in a container or bag with your child's name on it each day. The children should only have water in their water bottles.

BIRTHDAY CELEBRATIONS

Birthdays are an important time in young children's lives and we would like our students to celebrate their special day with friends. Families are more than welcome to bring a cake to share (individual cakes or biscuits are most suitable to save time and ease of distribution). Please arrange with Kindergarten staff beforehand so this can be accommodated in our daily timetable.

PHOTOS

Staff will take photos of children to document learning and achievement as well as for social purposes such as sharing with peers and families. These photos may be printed for use within the Kindergarten (displays of individual work sample books) or published in the Moora PS newsletter or Facebook.

From time to time photos may also be published in local news media to promote Moora Primary School. Please let the office know if you do not wish for your child's photo to be on display.

YOUR TRASH IS OUR TREASURE!

Junk materials make the best resources in Kindergartens. We will gratefully accept everyday items including plastic containers, magazines, used greeting cards, wrapping paper, old calendars, envelopes, cardboard tubes (not toilet rolls), paper or card off cuts, cereal boxes, egg cartons, buttons, corks, bottle tops, ribbons, lace, adhesive contact, shells...just about anything!!! If you've got something that you think we could use, tell us and we'll let you know.

CONCERNS / QUESTIONS

Please do not hesitate to contact the Kindergarten teacher to make an appointment if you wish to discuss any matters concerning your child, the program or anything else. As the parent/caregiver, you play a vital role in the education of your child. We believe that, with the contribution of your skills and experiences, together we can form a vibrant and productive partnership that benefits your child.

FURTHER INFORMATION

How can I help prepare my child for Kindy?

- During the holidays have a few practices with the lunch box and school bag. Pack a smallish recess and lunch and encourage your child to practice eating in a limited time. Make sure they can open their own lunch box or are capable of asking for help. Make it fun and have a picnic outdoors or have 'play kindy' for the day.
- Practise putting shoes on and taking them off so your child feels capable of doing it on their own. Likewise, practise going to the toilet without any help.
- Provide experiences - picnics, visits to friends, shopping, visiting new places; etc. - that will give your child a background of information. Tell your child the names of places and things.
- Sing - nursery rhymes and songs with your child.
- READ TO YOUR CHILD - nursery rhymes, poems and stories. Read a bedtime story and ask questions about the story as you read.
- See that books are available and WELL cared for.
- See that your child has some of these materials at home - dressing-up clothes, paper, paints, blocks, blunt nosed scissors and glue. Your child needs room to play with toys and other paraphernalia, and sometimes the encouragement to tidy up when finished with things.
- If your child wishes to write his/her name, please do not use all capital letters, eg it should be John not JOHN. This is a habit which is very hard to break.
- Sometimes scribe for your child, i.e. write down a "story" as your child tells it. Get your child to draw a picture about the story to include with it. Your child will love looking back at them when they are older.
- Let your child dress themselves, even though it takes time. Your child needs to learn to put on their socks - with the heels in the right position, to put shoes on the proper feet, as well as tying the laces or doing up the buckles.
- Encourage your child to do things for themselves so that they grow in independence. Don't do too much for your child in areas where they are capable of self management. On the other hand, don't push your child if they are not ready, do it together.
- Give your child a chance to know and play with other children. If possible, arrange for your child to play at a friend's or relation's home without your presence so that they will have been away from you at least a few hours before commencing school. It softens the blow when that first day of school arrives.
- Encourage your child to talk. Answer their questions and encourage their interest in the daily environment and activities. The best preparation for reading and writing is good oral language development.
- Play games as a family.
- Give the family time to talk with each other by sometimes turning off the television.

How can I help my child settle in to Kindy?

- Once your child is settled, it is helpful for you to leave. Sometimes, the longer parents stay, the more unsettled the child becomes. You are welcome to ring the school later to check on your child and be assured that we will ring you if we have any concerns.
- Please make sure that everything your child wears and brings to school is marked with your child's name e.g. clothes, lunchboxes, drink bottles and bag (attach a distinctive label/ribbon to their bag to help them recognise it in case others have the same).
- Do not allow your child to bring any toys, jewellery etc to school. They may get lost or broken.
- It is important to be on time to collect your child otherwise they can become quite anxious. A couple of minutes can be a long time for your child, especially if they are the only child left.
- Never let your child stay at home just because they are reluctant to go to school.
- After you collect your child from school, show interest in what they did that day. Talk to your child about pleasant school day experiences.

What should I do if I have worries or questions to ask?

- Talk to us! The Teacher is very happy to talk with you and discuss concerns.
- If it is a straightforward matter that won't take long, chat to us before or after school.
- If you would like an uninterrupted time to chat, please talk to the teacher to organise a time where this will be possible.
- You can also contact the teacher by phone if you are not able to in person. This is best done after school hours as you will have our full attention without students around.

What will my child be learning at Kindy?

How to:

- Listen and respond to adults other than their parents and follow group directions.
- Follow a routine and set of rules and gradually understand that these are necessary for the safety and well-being of everyone.
- Share – both equipment and the teacher's time.
- Use their words to request things politely – manners, asking for a turn, asking for assistance.
- Start a conversation with a peer or an adult, make friends, include others and take turns
- Be respectful and show consideration for others.
- Tolerate situations and children that are perhaps a bit different from their previous experiences.
- Be self-disciplined and use their words to express their feelings. This means being with other children without hitting, punching, pushing etc when something happens they don't like.
- Tell the difference between right and wrong.
- Accept that misbehaviour brings consequences that are designed to teach children that some behaviours are undesirable.
- Take care of their own belongings and the school's property.
- Care for the school environment by helping to keep it clean and tidy.
- Clear away materials that they are no longer using.
- Become independent and start doing things for themselves.
- Take pride in their efforts and always try their hardest.

These are the things of foremost importance that your child will be learning throughout Kindy. The stepping stones that will help them to be successful throughout the rest of their lives, no matter what they end up doing.

Of course we will also be learning how to cut on a line, hold a pencil properly, recognise our names, shapes and colours. How to count, hop, climb, question and explore. We will be doing many things throughout our year at Kindergarten and not all of them will be immediately obvious or able to be brought home on a piece of paper.

Moora Primary School Kindergarten program follows the mandated Kindergarten Guidelines Early Years Framework and students' reports will reflect these outcomes. Our Kindergarten is very play based and allows for exploration and learning of all kinds.

All aspects of Kindergarten will be incredibly important for our growth and development into the thoughtful and caring adult we will one day become.
